Sherborne St John Parish Council

There was no meeting in October. Rosie Burton, our new clerk, is finding her feet and we hope she enjoys working for us.

New Allotments

We have 24 new allotments at Marnell Park . Each plot marked out and well divided. We welcome Marnell Park residents to join the allotment family; they will be given first refusal on any plots but any not taken up will be offered to the Parish . Further information please contact the clerk.

Chute Recreation Ground

There is lots happening at the Chute Pavilion and play area. The Pavilion is to get a new boiler and showers; very welcome for the football club.

Play Area

For the younger children the play area is to get a revamp with 4 pieces to be replaced; the council is looking for ideas. The Parish clerk would like to hear what the children of the Parish would like to see installed - maybe mum and dad can help them decide.

Solar Farm

In August RWE Energy held a consultation event at the village hall regarding their proposed solar farm which lies on 80 hectares of the 3 agricultural fields between Aldermaston road and the Vyne Road in Sherborne St John (SSJ).

There was concern expressed from local residents that although generation of solar energy is positive from an environmental point of view, this is the wrong site, as it includes some of our most attractive countryside alongside the main footpath route from the village, following the chalk stream and wildlife corridor to the Vyne and Morgaston Wood . The Parish Council also met with Pamber Heath Parish Council to discuss their concerns regarding a separate part of the RWE site which falls within Little London. The scheme appears to conflict with several policies in the recently adopted SSJ Neighbourhood Plan, which seeks to protect the landscape alongside the stream and key views to this corridor to the Vyne, including the biodiversity corridor and the conservation area adjoining the Mill House.

Following advice from our planning consultants ET planning at the last meeting, given the push towards renewable energy in local and national planning policy it seems that it will be challenging to achieve an outright refusal of this proposal. Where a planning refusal was previously achieved for the solar farm at Bramley, this was subsequently overturned at appeal. We therefore wrote to the company outlining our planning concerns regarding the scale, location of the siting of solar panels, other agricultural land in the same ownership which could have been used to the west towards Aldermaston Rd would have less effect on the setting of the Vyne, but is very prominent visually from the Aldermaston Rd.

In October the 2 parish councils met with RWE Energy to discuss the scheme ,at the meeting , the company

stated that following our comments, they were prepared to move the siting of the panels 75 metres back from the footpath route, which runs though the western field (plus provide a 3 metrewide high screening hedge) Also to provide some additional landscaping at the eastern field. This will partly mitigate some of the worst landscape impacts of the solar farm on the main footpath route between the village and the Vyne. Our local councillor, David McIntire, is also due to meet RWE Energy to discuss the proposal and it is hoped that if it does go ahead, we can improve further on the first offer to set the panels further back from the footpath. It will still be visible from the Vyne estate and we have asked the National Trust to give their views regarding the impact on their historic setting. At the time of writing a formal planning application is still to be submitted and they currently plan to have work completed by 2027/8

Your Council continues to support the local community bus to Chineham on a Friday morning , also support for a coffee morning which is in the village hall every 2 weeks on a Monday - a special time for a chat and a tea or coffee. while making new friends and to meet up with old friends. The next dates are December 2nd , 16th , and 30th

North Hampshire (Star Studded) Prostate Cancer Support Group Meeting



The Mayor Councillor Dan Putty said a few words of introduction:

He has been a councillor since 1995 and is strongly focused on local voluntary trusts and charities and has chosen NHPCSG as one of his charities for 2024

The renowned and respected Professor Langley gave an interesting and surprisingly entertaining presentation entitled "Can PSA Screening and Prostate Brachytherapy Extend Your Life". His sources for information included Public Health England, NICE, the Lancet and of course the Daily Mail.

He started with a brief history of the PSA test, from the discovery of Prostate Specific Antigens by American forensic scientists in the 1980s.

The goal is to detect Prostate Cancer early to allow for treatment before it

spreads. Unfortunately there are no signs of early symptoms and unlike Breast Cancer self-examination is not possible.

The best option we have currently is the PSA blood test, but it is not tumour specific, it cannot differentiate between a Pussycat or a Tiger cancer.

In 2005 the NHS guidelines to GPs was that any man over 50 can ask for a PSA test, but Public Health England's Prostate Cancer Risk Management Advice shockingly states that GPs should NOT raise the prospect of Prostate Cancer with candidate men who visit them for other reasons.

So why are we not screening?

There have been some historical clinical trials in Europe and the USA, but the results have been maligned due to sample size and contamination. There have also been well publicised fears regarding the risk of over diagnosis and subsequent over-treatment affecting the patient's quality of life. But now we have the MRI scan as part of the treatment path to further screen a patient prior to a biopsy (Transperineal nowadays, far safer than the old school Transrectal).

We are relying on men being proactive and asking their GPs for a PSA test. There are local situations (like the Lions PSA testing) and celebrity sufferers who will cause an influx of testing requests, but it is still not a targeted screening programme. That is what the Transform program will demonstrate the need for. With targeted prostate health checks aimed at men on active GP Databases to invite them for a test rather than waiting for them to ask.

After the testing comes the treatment and there we have to balance the treatment side effects against the patient lifestyle impacts and longevity.

Brachytherapy vs Beam Radiotherapy vs Radical Prostatectomy, all have their side effects that can affect every man to different degrees. The treatment paths can be varied; the number of days hospital stay, the number of clinic visits for treatment, the additional hormone therapy drugs that may or may not be needed, all must be considered for each patient.

For those having recently been diagnosed but questioning which treatment to opt for , the group holds a 'Pint and Chat' the first Thursday of the month at the Red Lion, London Street, Basingstoke – from 7:30 pm, with an increasing number of men finding these times invaluable.



The latest meeting of the Monk Sherborne Parish Council was held on Wednesday 13th of November at 7.20pm, the following items were discussed:

The Chairman advised of his attendance at Remembrance Day, having laid a wreath on behalf of Monk Sherborne Parish Council. The additional poppies erected within the parish were noted by several parishioners. Once these are taken down, they will be stored for future use in the Village Hall

Members were also alerted to the proposed meeting dates for 2025. A list is to be erected on the parish noticeboards and website.

An update in relation to the enforcement for The Olive Tree is awaited from BDBC. Members were advised by BDBC that a request had been presented for a retrospective planning application to be submitted for the works underway.

All Saints Church, Rookery Farm Lane Monk Sherborne has applied for work to be carried out to trees in the church grounds which has been supported.

Cllr Boyle advised that he had met with Highways who advised they would attend to clear the ditches and sump at the War Memorial to alleviate the flooding issues experienced. Highways are to be chased to ascertain the dates for the work.

Cllr Cave gave an update on the recent Village Night and the 60s evening that was held on the 9th of November. The Village Nights continue to be well supported, when beer and wine are on offer at very reasonable cost to bring the community together. The next one will be on Thursday 5th of December.

All works at the play area have been completed with the addition of grass matting being installed at the entrance from the car park to the main play area. This work will be followed with matting from the Village Hall Patio on to the Play Area in the New Year.

Members acknowledged the release of the S106 funds for new access gates to the playing field of £1,278 and the

approval of the release of a further £445 for grass mats to be installed from the entrance to the new play area from the car park. Thanks were expressed to Cllr S Minas-Bound for his assistance in the pursuit of the release of the S106 funds

It was also acknowledged that the Village Hall had contributed £300 to cover the shortfall in funding for the access gates. These funds were generated from various community events such as the Village Nights, the 60s Night and the Village Fete. This amount will accompanied by the donation of a new round table and seating by the Village Hall to replace one that has seen better days, this will be installed in the Spring.

SSJ Neighbourhood Watch

Have you heard of the 159 number? Join the fight against Scammers

This is a new facility provided by the police and below is their description of its function. Supplied to NHW by Hants Aware

If you receive a call from someone claiming to be from your bank, **stop**, **hang up and dial 159**. This is the hotline designed to fight fraud. Calling 159 is a positive step you can make to challenge scammers and protect yourself. When you call 159, you'll be put through to your bank directly and securely. The 159 hotline is managed by Stop Scams UK. This also applies if someone contacts you claiming to be from the Police, Fraud Squad or a similar authority asking you to transfer money. Don't transfer any money or provide any bank details. **Hang up and call 159**

If you feel uneasy or suspicious about a call you have received from someone asking for financial details or pressuring you into a making a payment, it's not rude to hang up. It is reasonable and sensible to do that and call 159. Do not feel bad about it.

You will never receive a call from 159. If you do either don't answer, or if you answer by mistake, hang up immediately. If you received a call from 159 on your landline, don't use the same landline to dial 159 and report the scam (the criminals could keep the line open). Instead, use a mobile or different device to call 159. Some fraudsters can match the number that comes up on your phone with your bank's number or the 159 number, a technique known as number spoofing. Therefore it's always best to dial the number yourself if you're worried that a call you've received isn't genuine.

Beau's Blog



News from Clift Surgery

No one visiting or living in Bramley could fail to notice the seemingly endless roadworks that have been ripping up our village and surrounding areas.

These have affected everyone, but it has been a particularly difficult time for the surgery.

With the numerous traffic lights, road closures, and building going on, plus the level crossing, travelling to and from the surgery has been difficult for those with appointments and visiting the dispensary. Parking had improved with the newly painted bays, but it is still sometimes necessary to park on the road outside. Now cars are contending with the extra traffic caused by the building alongside the surgery and deliveries of building materials can block the road occasionally.

The surgery has had several retirements, staff changes, maternity leave over the previous months. Every individual has made a positive impact to the practice and patients they have cared for and we would like to thank them for their hard work, dedication. We are enjoying being kept up to date with their adventures and endeavours.

The surgery is about to welcome two new GPs in the coming months. They have trained at the surgery, and both wish to return to work here. There is also a new Health Care Assistant (HCA) about to start and a new phlebotomist is being trained by our newly promoted senior HCA and lead nurse.

Areas we continue to enhance is the dispensary. Many will be aware that the dispensary is extremely busy and is taking longer than is ideal despite the team's best efforts. The surgery is working hard to provide the service patients deserve. Therefore, the surgery has invested in upgrading to a new IT system and have successfully recruited new starters to support the changes.

There are times when medicines have to be sourced elsewhere which can also delay issuing medicines, but also there have been times when the delivery vans have not been able to get through to the surgery at the allotted time due to the road works. Although this has only meant a delay of 24 hours, this has had an impact.

The new electronic dispensing system which will use bar codes and automated systems to track and order prescriptions and once embedded it should make the turnaround much quicker. You will still be able to submit a paper request if that is your preference.

If you have run out of your medication, please contact the surgery and you will

be able to get an emergency supply. No one needs to go without.

NB with Christmas approaching, please put in your order early to cover Christmas and the New Year. Dispensary opening times 8.30 -1 pm, 1 to 1.30 pm for emergency dispensing, and 2-6pm plus emergency dispensing until 6.30pm.

The PPG is working hard to support both patients and the surgery. Apart from listening to patient concerns and liaising with surgery, it is about to install a planter in the front garden to make the outside more welcoming and will keep it topped up with flowers during the spring and summer.

A date for your diary. The Primary Care Network to which Clift Surgery belongs, is holding a Healthy Living Day at the Pavilion and Brocas Hall on Tuesday 14th January between 11am and 3pm. There will be three speakers, and stalls from local organisations to offer advice on keeping healthy. The PPG will be providing refreshments so do come along and see what is on offer. Probus Visit to D-Day HQ



In the 80th Anniversary year of the D-Day landings an inspiring visit to the war time HQ brought home the realities of the largest amphibious assault in history.

The United States of America recognizes the selfless service and manifold contributions of General Dwight David Eisenhower, Supreme Allied Commander, 1944-1945. At this site, General Eisenhower, on behalf of freedom loving peoples throughout the World, directed the Allied landings on Normandy, 6 June 1944.

This plaque was dedicated by a United States Department of Defense delegation and the Eisenhower family on 5 June 1990 during the Centennial year of his birth and the 46th Anniversary of Operation OVERLORD.

A group of members and families from the Probus Club of Basingstoke had an impressive visit to Southwick House (locally pronounced "Suthick") positioned five miles north of Portsmouth that had a pivotal role in the planning of D-Day.

It was the Supreme Headquarters of the main allied commanders, led by Allied Supreme Commander General Dwight D Eisenhower, Naval Commanderin-Chief Admiral Ramsey, Army Commander-in-Chief General Montgomery, and Commander-in-Chief Allied Air Force, Air Chief Marshal Leigh-Mallory. The grounds became the Main Tactical Base for the 21st Army Group for their forthcoming invasion plans.



Richard Callaghan, the curator, gave an extensive narrative about the map room that still contains the enormous graphic showing the invasion plans. His talk was interwoven with anecdotes about incidents involving the main characters that gave life to this history lesson.



How General Eisenhower became very close to his English driver Kay Summersby and was prevented by the Republican party from taking her back to America, as they declared that they could not accept a divorcee to run for the Presidency. He remained married to Maime and had two terms as President of the United States.

Deception was used to convince the German high command that the invasion would come across the shortest route from Kent to Pas de Calais which caused German divisions to move from the Normandy region.



James Stagg was the meteorologist providing weather forecasts to the senior planning group. As a civilian it was thought he would have difficulty in ensuring his predictions would be taken seriously so he was presented with the uniform of a RAF Group Captain. It was Stagg that convinced General Eisenhower to postpone the

assault from the planned day of 5th June to 6th June 1944.

6,000 ships were involved moving from all regions of southern England to the main dispersal area that became known as Piccadilly Circus and then had to pass through corridors cleared through minefields in the Channel. Due to detailed planning only seven ships were involved in collisions.

Despite the break in the weather there was still a swell, and the floating Sherman tanks were launched too far out from the shore resulting in only four out of thirty-two reaching the beach. It had been necessary to ensure that the beach would support such vehicles by night-time investigations in the previous weeks that had not been spotted by the land-based Germans.

In the adjacent bar room, the original weather maps were on the wall along with other memorabilia including models of two LCT (Landing Craft Tank) ships that were the subject of a talk some years ago by a Probus Club member. He had trained as a radio operator on such vessels whose role was getting armoured vehicles on to the beaches because their bow dropped on to the shore. Once unloaded they could raise their bow and reverse off the beach ready to return to England for another cargo of armoured vehicles.

The successful completion over several days of Operation Overlord on the Normandy beaches was the beginning of the end of WW2

North Hampshire Prostate Support Group - Goes Flying



Well not literally, but with the inspirational talk by Lucy Butcher, the Hampshire and Isle of Wight Air Ambulance Engagement Support officer, all who visited from the group got off to a flying start, just like the little helicopter that is a growing sight in our skies. What most did not realise was that the charity also runs a fleet of 4 fast response well equipped cars, which are often used in preference to the helicopter, which needs an area the size of a tennis court for a landing pad. In addition, the space in the helicopter is very compact, thereby limiting the scope of working on critical patients. Again, landing on a motorway is never ideal. Similarly, if the cloud base is below 500 feet then they are not permitted to fly, and a ground response becomes essential.

The charity receives no funding from Government, but instead receives its funds typically from community events, legacies and trust funds, generating last year just over £10M. This may sound a lot, but when compared to the cost of a lift off at £3500 each time, with on average 5 lifts a day – with one day recently involving 13, the need for us the public to be generous in our support becomes very clear. Some of this funding also provides for a support team caring for those who have witnessed traumatic events in which the team has been involved.



Lucy went on to outline the call-out process. The service is closely linked to South Central Ambulance service, where two of the team sit in on all the typically 3000 calls for an ambulance that service receives each day. One of these is a senior doctor, the other a despatcher, with often the doctor using their experience and intuition to gauge whether to go live. The medical team, currently based at Thruxton Airfield, consist of a pilot – normally ex-military, a senior doctor, often of consultant level, and two highly trained paramedics. On receipt of a radio call to 'Go', they will spend a few

minutes initially planning their response, including of course identifying suitable landing sites.

It is once on site that the extensive training kicks in. The operations centre has a special room set up to provide training for a wide range of different situations, and teams spend most of their time when not out on call honing their skills. Unlike normal ambulance crews, the Air Ambulance teams can administer coma inducing drugs should this be required; the aim always being to first stabilise the patient, before transport and where appropriate delivery direct to a well-equipped hospital operating theatre for the next stage of their treatment. Understandably there are times when stabilisation is not enough, and both amputations and even open-heart surgery has had to be done in the field, this being possible due to the high level of the medical staff in the team, all of whom are paid by the charity. However, despite all the training, there will also be scope for the unexpected, as a recent landing in a farmer's field demonstrated when the resident bull perhaps perceived the helicopter as competition for his mistresses and charged, fortunately damage was minimal.






